## NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

These notes form an integral part of and should be read in conjunction with the accompanying financial statements.

#### 1. General information

Singapore Hospice Council ("SHC") is registered with the Registry of Societies under the Societies Act (Chapter 311) in Singapore on 5 May 1995. SHC is a charity registered under the Charities Act since 3 August 1996. It has been granted an Institution of a Public Character ("IPC") status for the period from 1 October 2017 to 30 September 2019.

Its registered address and principal place of business is at 1 Lorong 2 Toa Payoh, Level 7, Yellow Pages Building, Singapore 319637.

The objectives of SHC are:

- (a) to coordinate and promote hospice and palliative care in Singapore;
- (b) to provide and coordinate training in hospice and palliative care;
- (c) support efforts in improving the quality of hospice and palliative care in Singapore;
- (d) undertake such activities which are incidental or conductive to the attainment of the above objects including:
  - to act as the representative body for hospice and palliative care in Singapore, nationally and internationally; and
  - (ii) to promote public awareness of hospices and palliative care services in Singapore

## 2. Significant accounting policies

# 2.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Financial Reporting Standards in Singapore ("FRSs") and the disclosure requirements of the Charities Act. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except as disclosed in the accounting policies below.

These financial statements are presented in Singapore Dollar (S\$), which is SHC's functional currency.

The preparation of these financial statements in conformity with FRSs requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying SHC's accounting policies. It also requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates and assumptions.

The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements are disclosed in Note 3.

## 2.1.1 Interpretations and amendments to published standards on or after 1 April 2017

SHC has adopted the new or revised FRSs and Interpretations to FRSs (INT FRSs) that are mandatory for application from that date. Changes to SHC's accounting policies have been made as required, in accordance with the relevant transitional provisions in the respective FRSs and INT FRSs. The following are the FRSs and INT FRSs that are relevant to the SHC:

## 2.1. Basis of preparation (Cont'd)

2.1.1 Interpretations and amendments to published standards on or after 1 April 2017 (cont'd)

The adoption of these new or amended FRSs and INT FRSs did not result in substantial changes to the accounting policies of SHC and had no material effect on the amounts reported for the current or prior financial year.

SHC has not adopted the following relevant new/revised FRSs, INT FRSs and amendments to FRSs that were issued but not yet effective:

Except FRS116, management believes that the adoption of the revised standards and interpretations will have no material impact on the financial statements in the period of initial application. The impending change in FRS 116 will have material impact on the financial statements as discussed below.

# FRS 116 Leases

FRS 116 requires lessees to recognise most leases on balance sheets to reflect the rights to use the leased assets and the associated obligations for lease payments as well as the corresponding interest expense and depreciation charges. The standard includes two recognition exemption for lessees - leases of 'low value' assets and short-term leases. The new standard is effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2019. The Council Members are currently assessing the impact of the new standard and plans to adopt the new standard on the required effective date. The Company expects the adoption of the new standard will result in increase in total assets and total liabilities, EBITDA.

# 2.2 Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognised when it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to SHC and the amount of revenue can be measured reliably, regardless of when the payment is being made. Revenue comprises the fair value of the consideration received or receivable for the services rendered in the ordinary course of SHC's activities. Revenue is recognised as follows:

# 2.2.1 Donations

Uncommitted donations, income from charity events and all income except as listed below, are recognised on receipt basis. Donations-in-kind are recognised when the fair value of the assets received can be reasonably ascertained.

## 2.2.2 Government grants

Grants are recognised when there is reasonable assurance SHC will comply with the conditions related to them and that the grants are certain to be received.

## 2.2 Revenue recognition (Cont'd)

#### 2.2.3 Income from services

Income from services is recognised over the period in which the services are rendered, by reference to completion of the specific transaction assessed on the basis of the actual service provided as a proportion of the total services to be performed.

#### 2.2.4 Interest income

Interest income is recognised on a time-proportion basis using the effective interest method.

### 2.2.5 Other income

Other income is recognised when received.

## 2.3. Government grants

Government grants are recognised when there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all attaching conditions will be complied with. Where the grant relates to an asset, the fair value is recognised as deferred capital grant on the statement of financial position and is amortised to statement of financial activities over the expected useful life of the relevant asset by equal annual installments.

#### 2.4 Expense recognition

All expenses are accounted for on accrual basis, aggregated under the respective areas. Direct costs are attributed to the activity where possible. Where costs are not wholly attributable to an activity, they are apportioned on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Cost of charitable activities comprises all costs incurred in the pursuit of the charitable objects of SHC. The total costs of charitable expenditure include an apportionment of overhead and shared costs.

Governance and administrative costs include costs of governance arrangement, which relate to the general running of SHC, providing governance infrastructure and ensuring public accountability. These costs include costs related to constitutional and statutory requirements and an apportionment of overhead and shared costs.

# 2.5 Operating leases

Leases of assets in which a significant portion of the risks and rewards of ownership are retained by the lessor are classified as operating leases. Payments made under operating leases (net of any incentives received from the lessor) are taken to the statement of financial activities on a straight-line basis over the period of the lease. When an operating lease is terminated before the lease period has expired, any payment required to be made to the lessor by way of penalty is recognised as an expense in the period in which termination takes place.

Rental on operating lease is charged to the statement of financial activities. Contingent rents are recognised as an expense in the statement of financial activities in the financial year in which they are incurred.

## 2.6 Employee benefits

### 2.6.1 Defined contribution plans

Defined contribution plans are post-employment benefit plans under which SHC pays fixed contributions into separate entities such as the Central Provident Fund ("CPF"), on a mandatory, contractual or voluntary basis. SHC has no further payment obligations once the contributions have been paid. SHC's contribution to defined contribution plans are recognised as employee compensation expense when they are due.

## 2.6.2 Employee leave entitlement

Employee entitlements to annual leave are recognised when they accrue to employees. A provision is made for the estimated liability for annual leave as a result of services rendered by employees up to the reporting date.

#### 2.7 Income tax

SHC is a charity registered under the Charities Act since 3 August 1996. Consequently, the income of SHC is exempted from tax under the provisions of Section 13 of the Income Tax Act Cap. 134.

#### 2.8 Financial assets

#### 2.8.1 Classification

SHC classifies its financial assets as loans and receivables. The classification depends on the purpose for which the assets were acquired. Management determines the classification of its financial assets at initial recognition.

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. They are included in current assets, except those maturing later than 12 months after the reporting date, which are classified as non-current assets. Loans and receivables are classified as "Cash and cash equivalents" and "Trade and other Receivables" on the statement of financial position.

# 2.8.2 Recognition and derecognition

Regular way usual purchases and sales of financial assets are recognised on trade-date – the date on which SHC commits to purchase or sell the asset.

Financial assets are derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows from the financial assets have expired or have been transferred and SHC has transferred substantially all risks and rewards of ownership. On disposal of a financial asset, the difference between the net sale proceeds and its carrying amount is taken to the statement of financial activities. Any amount in the fair value reserve relating to that asset is also taken to the statement of financial activities.

# 2.8.3 Initial measurement

Financial assets are initially recognised at fair value plus transaction costs except for financial assets at fair value through the statement of financial activities, which are recognised at fair value. Transaction costs for financial assets at fair value through the statement of financial activities are recognised immediately as expenses.

# 2.8 Financial assets (cont'd)

# 2.8.4 Subsequent measurement

Loans and receivables are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

### 2.8.5 Impairment

SHC assesses at each reporting date whether there is objective evidence that a financial asset or a group of financial assets is impaired and recognises an allowance for impairment when such evidence exists.

Significant financial difficulties of the debtor, probability that the debtor will enter bankruptcy or financial reorganisation, and default or delinquency in payments are objective evidence that the receivable is impaired.

An allowance for impairment of loans and receivables including trade and other receivables is recognised when there is objective evidence that SHC will not be able to collect all amounts due according to the original terms of the receivables.

The amount of the allowance is the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows, discounted at the original effective interest rate. When the amount becomes uncollectible, it is written off against the allowance account. Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off are recognised against the same line item in the statement of financial activities.

The allowance for impairment loss account is reduced through the statement of financial activities in a subsequent period when the amount of impairment losses decreases and the related decrease can be objectively measured. The carrying amount of the asset previously impaired is increased to the extent that the new carrying amount does not exceed the amortised cost had no impairment been recognised in prior periods.

# 2.9 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include deposits with financial institutions that are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

## 2.10 Plant and equipment

# 2.10.1 Measurement

Plant and equipment are initially recognised at cost and subsequently carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses.

The cost of an item of plant and equipment initially recognised includes its purchase price and any costs that are directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management.

## 2.10 Plant and equipment (cont'd)

## 2.10.2 Depreciation

Depreciation on plant and equipment is calculated using the straight-line method to allocate their depreciable amounts over their estimated useful lives as follows:

Fully depreciated assets are retained in SHC's records until they are no longer in use and no further depreciation and amortisation is charged to current operations.

The residual values, estimated useful lives and depreciation method of plant and equipment are reviewed, and adjusted as appropriate, at each reporting date. The effects of any revision are recognised in the statement of financial activities in the financial year in which the changes arise.

## 2.10.3 Subsequent expenditure

Subsequent expenditure relating to plant and equipment that has already been recognised is added to the carrying amount of the asset only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to SHC and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. Other subsequent expenditure is recognised as repair and maintenance expenses in the statement of financial activities during the financial year in which it is incurred.

## 2.10.4 Disposal

On disposal of an item of plant and equipment, the difference between the net disposal proceeds and its carrying amount is taken to the statement of financial activities.

### 2.11 Impairment of non-financial assets

Plant and equipment are reviewed for impairment whenever there is any indication that these assets may be impaired. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount (i.e. the higher of the fair value less cost to sell and value in use) of the assets is estimated to determine the amount of impairment loss.

For the purpose of impairment testing of the assets, recoverable amount is determined on an individual asset basis unless the asset does not generate cash flows that are largely independent of those from other assets. If this is the case, recoverable amount is determined for the cash-generating unit (CGU) to which the asset belongs.

If the recoverable amount of the asset (or CGU) is estimated to be less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset (or CGU) is reduced to its recoverable amount. The impairment loss is recognised in the statement of financial activities.

An impairment loss for an asset is reversed if there has been a change in the estimates used to determine the assets' recoverable amount since the last impairment loss was recognised. The carrying amount of an asset is increased to its revised recoverable amount, provided that this amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined (net of depreciation) had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset in prior years. A reversal of impairment loss for an asset is recognised in the statement of financial activities.

#### 2.12 Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are recognised when SHC becomes a party to the contractual agreements of the instrument and are classified according to the substance of the contractual arrangements entered into. All interest related charges are recognised in the statement of financial activities. Financial liabilities include "Trade and other Payables" on the statement of financial position.

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the obligations under the liability are discharged, cancelled or expired. When existing financial liabilities are replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms of an existing liability or are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as a derecognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability, and the difference in respective carrying amounts is recognised in the statement of financial activities.

## 2.13 Trade and other payables

Trade and other payables are initially recognised at fair value, and subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest method.

#### 2.14 Provisions

Provisions for other liabilities and charges are recognised when SHC has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events, it is more likely than not that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation and the amount has been reliably estimated.

### 2.15 Funds

Fund balances restricted by outside sources are so indicated and are distinguished from unrestricted funds allocated to specific purposes, if any, by action of the Council Members. Externally restricted funds may only be utilised in accordance with the purposes for which they are established. The Council Members retains full control over the use of unrestricted funds for any of SHC's purposes.

# 3. Critical accounting estimates, assumptions and judgements

Estimates, assumptions and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

# 3.1 Critical accounting estimates, assumptions and judgments in applying accounting policies

SHC makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. There are no estimates, assumptions and judgments made that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year.

# 10. Accumulated fund

The accumulated fund represents the accumulated net income of SHC and is for the purpose of meeting its expenditure in accordance with the objectives of SHC.

During the year 2017, Council Members had approved the transfer of the remaining amount of \$\$3,710 in SHC-Lien Project Foundation fund to the accumulated fund.

# 11. NGPC palliative care standards fund

The National Guidelines for Palliative Care ("NGPC") is a project developed in fulfilment of one of the goals in the National Strategy for Palliative Care. The guidelines provide guidance in the delivery of high-quality care for the terminally ill, minimise gaps in service, improve the quality of training as well as ensure support for staff and volunteers serving in this field. The project is funded by the Ministry of Health ("MOH").

During the financial year, MOH agreed for the balance of the remaining amount of \$33,014 to be transferred and redesignated to the MOH community engagement and quality improvement fund.

# 12. MOH community engagement and quality improvement fund

The Ministry of Health ("MOH") community engagement and quality improvement fund comprises funds for the development of the palliative care sector through two programmes, namely,

# a) Community Engagement Initiative

The programme aims to raise awareness of end-of life ("EOL") care among the general public and health care professionals over three years through publicity campaigns. A community engagement kit and other collaterals covering key messages on palliative care and EOL will be developed and made available to the general public and health care professionals. SHC will also work via various training avenues in healthcare institutions to weave palliative care and EOL issues into the training curriculum for healthcare professionals.

# b) Quality Improvement Programme

The programme aims to help palliative care providers that are member organisations of SHC achieve good palliative care outcomes, helping them meet the requirements of the National Guidelines for Palliative Care, and to develop and sustain a quality improvement culture among palliative care providers.

The programmes are for a period of 3 years from 1 April 2017 to 31 March 2020. During the financial year, SHC received funding amounting to S\$1,173,454 from MOH.

#### 13. Temasek Foundation Cares grief and bereavement fund

The Temasek Foundation Cares grief and bereavement fund is for a programme to develop a community-based practice framework for grief and bereavement. The purpose of the project is to understand the experiences, attitudes and needs of bereaved persons; the availability and appropriateness of current bereavement care; to identify gaps in services and develop a community-based practice framework to provide timely bereavement support to the beneficiaries. The project is funded by Temasek Foundation Cares CLG Limited.

# 17. Financial risk management

SHC has limited exposure to the following risks through its charitable activities:

# 17.1 Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that SHC will encounter difficulty in meeting its financial obligations due to shortage of funds. SHC's exposure to liquidity risk arises primarily from mis-matches of the maturities of financial assets or liabilities.

SHC manages its liquidity risk by monitoring and maintaining a level of cash and bank balances deemed adequate by Management to fund SHC's operations.

#### 17.2 Credit risk

Credit risk is the potential financial loss resulting from the customer defaulting on his contractual obligations to SHC. The credit risk of liquid funds is limited because the counterparty is a bank with high credit rating assigned by international credit agencies. SHC has no significant concentration of credit risk.

SHC's maximum exposure to credit risk is represented by the carrying amount of financial assets recorded in the financial statements.

#### 17.3 Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of SHC's financial instruments will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates.

SHC's income and operating cash flows are not substantially affected by changes in market interest rates as they do not have significant interest-bearing assets or liabilities as at the reporting date.

The responsibility for managing the above risks is vested in the Management.

## 17.4 Fair value

As at 31 March 2018, the carrying amounts of the financial assets and liabilities recorded in the financial statements of SHC approximate their fair values due to their short-term nature.
